#### **GIANT STAIRWAY AND FURBER STEPS**

## OUR PLANNED FEBRUARY WALK GIANT STAIRWAY,

#### GIANT STAIRWAY, FEDERAL PASS, KATOOMBA FALLS, SCENIC WORLD BOARDWALK and FURBER STEPS at KATOOMBA

Friday 17<sup>th</sup> February 2017

It never rains but it pours. Last month I announced my encounter with cancer. This month I sadly have to announce that Libby had to have major surgery for cancer on the Friday before the above scheduled walk. The operation went well, she was in intensive care for almost a week. She came home on 28<sup>th</sup> Feb but it is expected she will have an extended recovery period. Another Touch of History

Bush Following are a few points of interest relating to paths the group would have trodden on

this walk.

Just off Cliff Drive near what is now known as Solitary Restaurant is an unkempt, unmaintained, un-signposted lookout. Not far from the top of the Golden Stairs is a lookout which is signposted but again it could only be described as unkempt and could certainly do with some maintenance. Those two neglected lookouts were originally named to honour two men who perhaps had the most significant impact on track construction in the Blue Mountains.

The first is McKays Lookout, named for Jim McKay, a ranger with the Katoomba Municipal Council in the early 1900s. The second is Bottings Lookout, named for Walter Botting, an assistant to Jim McKay.

Jim McKay had the vision of constructing a stairway to link Echo Point to the Federal Pass; he suggested its construction in 1911; it

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would be twenty-one years before the stairway was completed and became known as The Giant Stairway.

The Council did not grant approval for the stairway until 1916 when McKay and his assistants began cutting the steps into the cliff face using only handtools; no explosives were used on this project. By 1918 the Council was becoming concerned about the slow progress and expense; work was stopped. Four years later an estimate for the cost of completion was sought which must have been considered unacceptable as work fell into abeyance until 1932.

Prominent Blue Mountains photographer Harry Phillips and Councillor WC Soper launched a campaign to complete the project and work recommenced.

Often forced to hang over the cliffs on ropes, Jim McKay and Walter Botting worked tirelessly using only crowbars, picks, hammers and chisels to complete the stairway; take time to look for the pick and chisel marks on the rock faces next time you are on the Giant Stairway.

Thus the Giant Stairway was officially opened by Bertram Stevens, Premier of NSW on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> October 1932. Several thousand onlookers gathered for the event and watched three rockclimbers scale the second Sister and unfurl the Australian flag.

Other than the neglected lookouts, what acknowledgment did the two main protagonists receive for this remarkable achievement? A plaque at the top of the stairway states the steps were cut by Ranger McKay; Botting doesn't get a mention. Contrast that with Prince Henry Cliff Walk, it was named for that member of the royal family after he spent 20 minutes at Katoomba Railway Station in 1934. The stop was only scheduled for 10 minutes; perhaps those extra 10 minutes sealed the deal.

Part of the Federal Pass would have also been followed on this walk. The first section of this pass, from Leura Forest to Katoomba Falls, was opened in November 1900. A plethora of VIPs and Members of Parliament were present for the opening; the ceremony cost over  $\pounds 82$ ; the track construction cost was only a little more than  $\pounds 52$ . It appears a sense of entitlement is nothing new.

One of the plants encountered on this walk would have certainly been the Dragons Tail (Dracophyllum secundum) trailing from ledges on the Giant Stairway and around the Furber Steps. With a bit of luck a few may have been making a late display of clusters of their beautiful pinkish white tubular bellshaped flowers. These plants usually grow to about half a metre; in well-protected spots they may reach two metres. I have seen a close cousin of this plant, Dracophyllum fitzgeraldii, on the summit of Mount Gower on Lord Howe Island; it can grow up to thirteen metres high, but certainly doesn't on the wind blown Mt Gower summit, yet it has all the characteristics of the secundum. Mother Nature is amazing.
